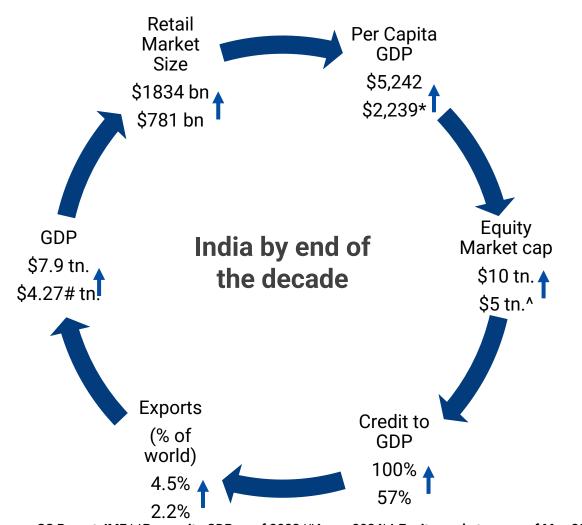

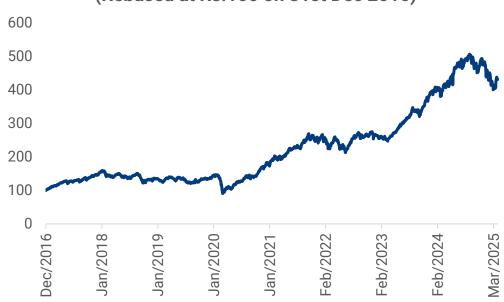


Index Level

■ Nifty Midcap 150 EPS

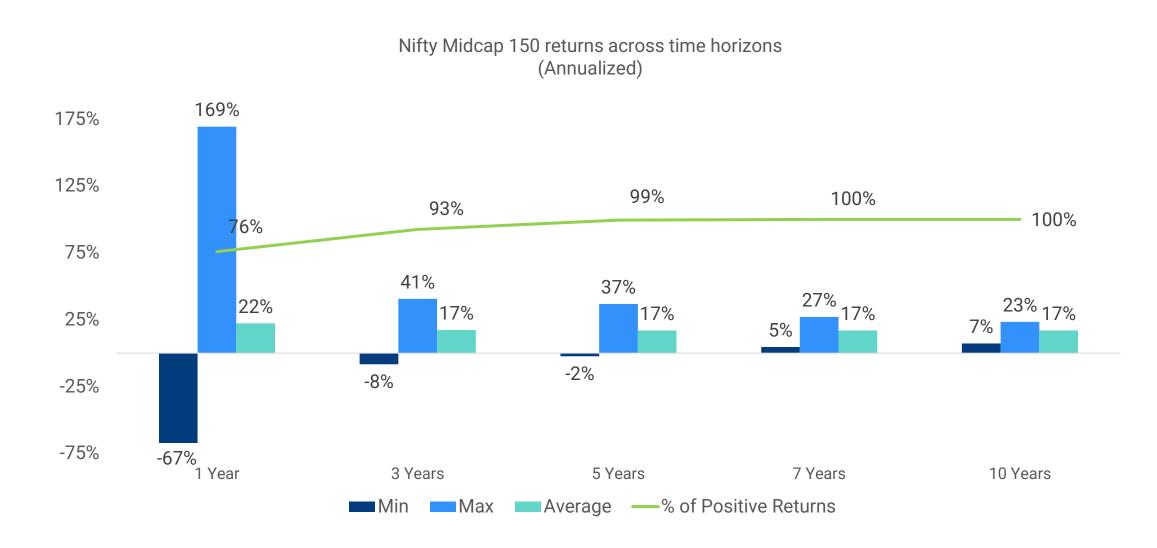


Rising Levels (Rebased at Rs.100 on 31st Dec 2016)

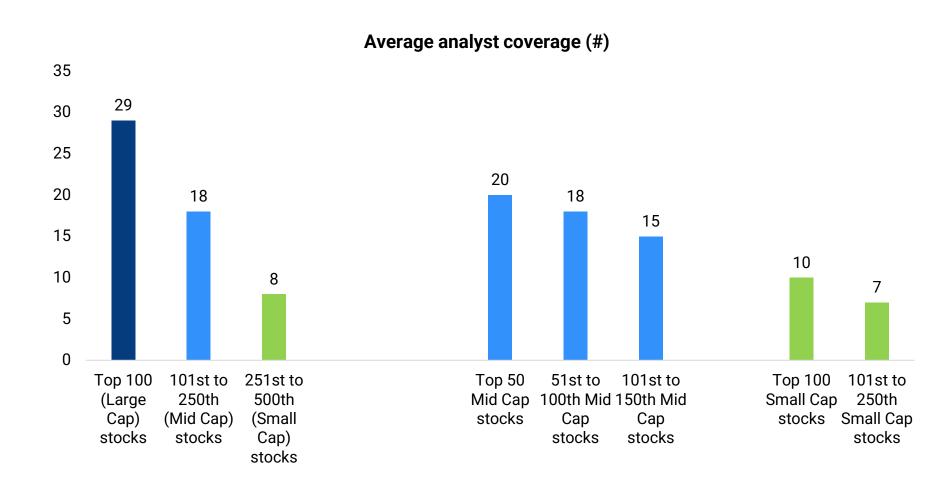

Investment Value Analysis Framework

- * We analyse stocks and categorise them under 3 buckets
 - i. Discounted Value stocks
 - ii. Compounding Value stocks
 - iii. Risk-management stocks Stocks we own due to their presence in benchmark
- * A combination of Discounted and compounding value makes us Value/Growth style agnostic

Discounted Investment Value

- * We derive discounted value based on % discount compared to intrinsic value of the stock
- This bucket includes event driven, deep Value and turnaround businesses
- Current Examples of businesses with static valueSBI and Indian Bank

Compounding Investment Value

- We derive compounded value based on estimated growth in intrinsic value over the next 2 years.
- This bucket includes consistent compounders that are sector leaders and market share gainers
- Current Examples of businesses with dynamic value Titan Company Ltd. and Trent Ltd.

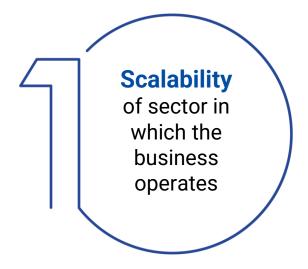

- 1. 5-year average core business returns more than 10% to ensure company is earning higher than its cost of capital.
- 2. Current year Sales, EBITDA, PAT should be more than 5-year average Sales, EBITDA, PAT to ensure we leave out de-growing companies.
- 3. Higher cash-flow conversion compared to sector peers over last business cycle.

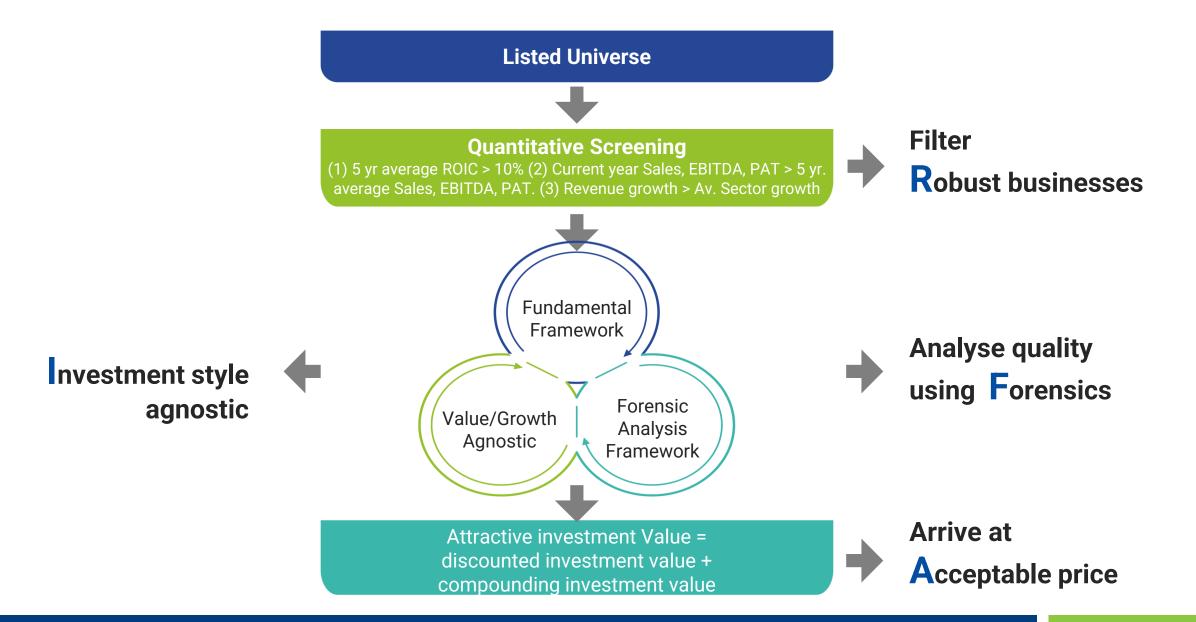

Not doing something is an active call and very important factor in investing

Take out-sized sector bets

Earnings of every sector goes through cycles and over longer period it is inline with broader market earnings. Hence, we avoid out-sized sector bets unless it is mandate of the fund



Macro calls may not work all the time given dynamic nature of our markets today compared to what they were in the past



Timing the market is difficult and hence, we keep our portfolios fully invested

Approach to Portfolio Construction



Buy/sell discipline



BUY

- * At FAIR estimate of intrinsic value
- Seeing catalyst/s for a high double-digit upside to the stock price.

SELL

- * At narrowing of discount to full value (Either due to deterioration of fundamentals or rising valuations)
- * Seeing extremely buoyant investor sentiment overriding fundamentals.
- When Corporate/Management actions violate the stock thesis.

Stock weight/sizing



- Guided by allocation of risk rather than allocation of money.
- * Based on size of the portfolio and the liquidity of the universe.
- * To achieve balance between return participation and risk control.
- * To space out portfolio to accommodate emerging opportunities.

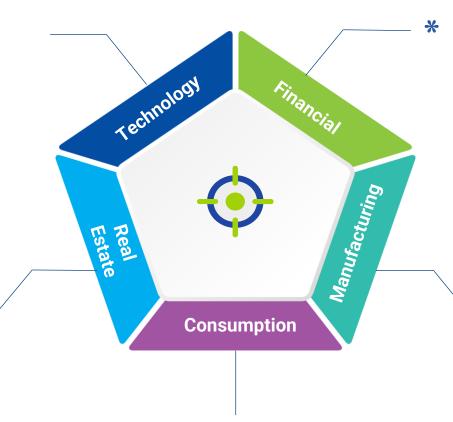


Themes/Sectors in focus



- Diversified revenue streams of Indian IT companies enhance their resilience in navigating economic slowdowns.
- * Strategically placed to benefit from expectations of revival in global growth.

- Building materials, a durable and proxy play in the real estate cycle, benefits from the unorganised to organised theme
- * Can generate better returns on equity due to its less capital-intensive nature and employing lower leverage.



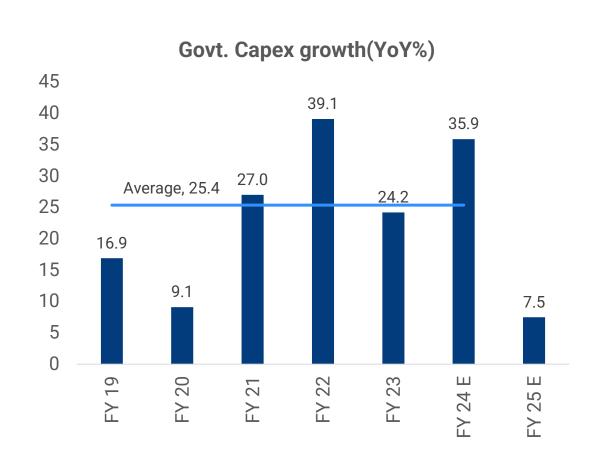
- * Asset quality stress in banks has bottomed out and return ratios are improving.
- NBFC and Capital market players are better placed than other players as earnings growth will be better.

- Government's thrust on capital expenditure to boost economy and high spends on infra bodes well for industrials.
- India's defence capex is expected to grow in sync with its nominal GDP growth rate, as per global trends
- Recent surge in power demand has outstripped supply that has remained static due to a lack of new capacities.
- * Rural recovery, driven by monsoons and rising disposable incomes, is improving access to diverse products in rural India
- Urban migration and effective marketing strategies are driving brand awareness and demand for affordable mass-produced goods in India.

Capex on the rise



India's gov. capex to increase by 35.9% in FY 24

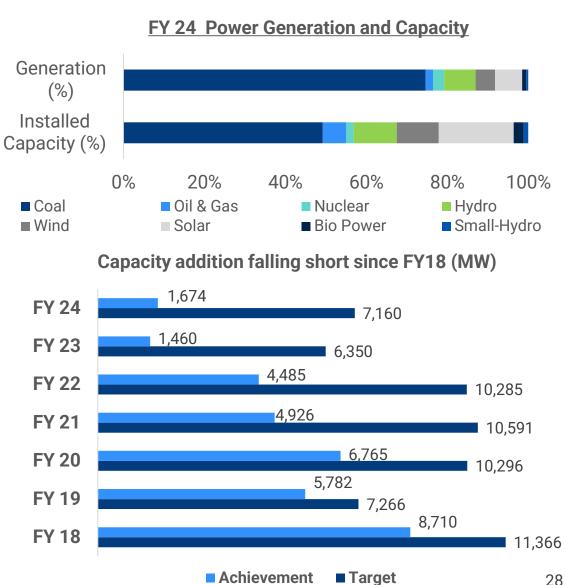


- * Government's thrust on capital expenditure to boost the economy and high spends on infra bodes well for industrials.
- * When interest rates rise the economy is usually on a stronger footing to withhold this regime change and hence, industrial activity tends to remain strong and resilient.
- * Industrial manufacturing businesses mostly benefit from high commodity prices since they can pass on the higher cost without impacting demand to a large extent.

Power sector – Electrifying growth expected



- * India's power consumption is on the rise and the demand is expected to peak from the current ~240 GW to ~335 GW in FY 30.
- * In the recent past, supply was higher than demand due to utilisation of capacities built more than 10-15 years ago.
- * Since most of the Government initiatives were behind clean. energy missions, no new capacities were built to meet the rising demand.
- * Because there is a long gestation period to build new power plants, it is imperative that the current companies in operation will have to increase their plant load factor to capture this opportunity.

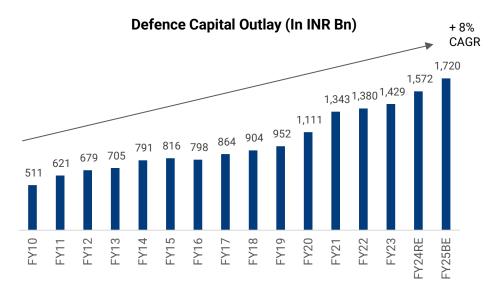

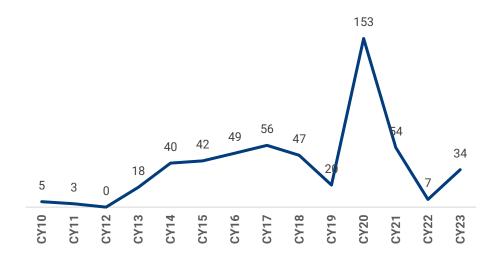

India Defence Exports (In US \$ Mn)

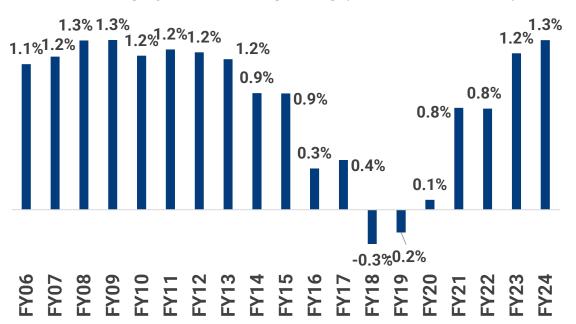

- * Banking sector credit growth was in a down-cycle since 2012 and is now seeing improvement.
- * Asset quality stress has bottomed out and return ratios are improving.
- * Within financials we like lenders as they are better placed than the capital market, insurance, or other players as earnings growth will be better.
- * We are overweight in many lenders within BFSI across our equity funds to play this opportunity

Building materials – a durable and proxy play in the real estate cycle



* Structural uptick in real estate industry

* The real estate sector in India is expected to reach US\$ 1 Trillion in market size by 2030, up from US\$ 200 billion in 2021. By 2025, it will contribute 13% to the country's GDP.

* Prospect of superior profitability

- * Building materials industry can generate better returns on equity compared to other sectors because these are less capital-intensive businesses and hence, employ lower leverage.
- * Across market cycles, the building material companies have been able to demonstrate pricing power and lower margin volatility despite volatile raw material price movements.

* Shift from unorganized to organized

- * Many of the building materials sub-segments like tiles, sanitaryware and plywood have a higher share of companies belonging to the unorganized sector.
- * This presents an opportunity to indirectly play the unorganized to organized theme.

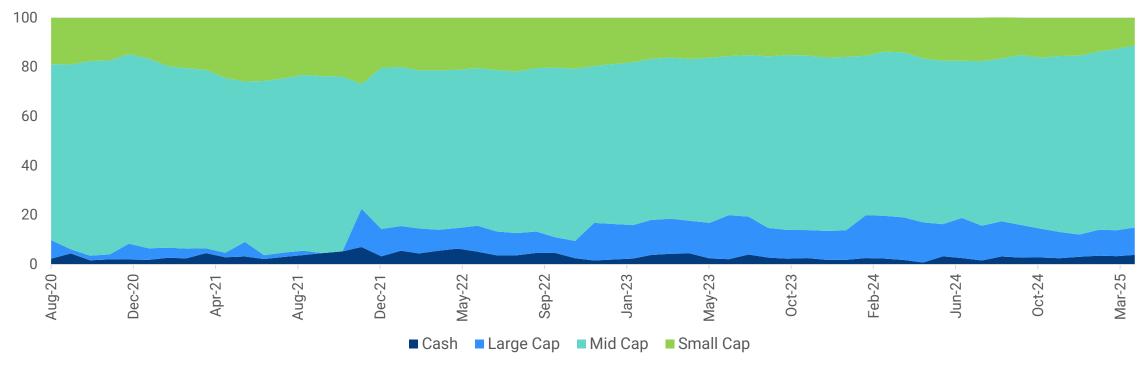

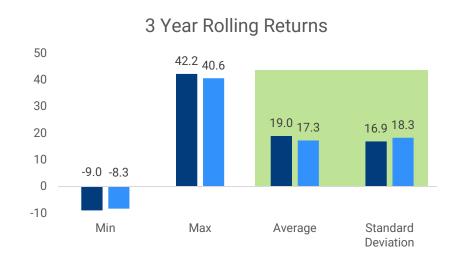

Strong performance across time horizons with less volatility vs the benchmark

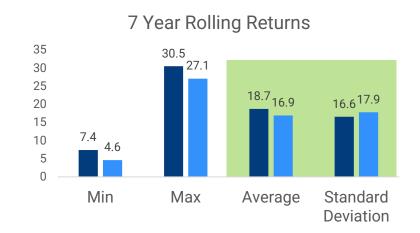

Fund manager commentary (1/2)



- * We are constructive on Indian equities from medium term perspective as domestic consumption and government and private led investments perk up economy. However, expect volatility in CY25 due to slowing economic growth, geopolitical events and higher starting valuations.
- * Heightened geopolitical uncertainty on back of a steep rise in fear of tariffs, sanctions and occasional conflict. Stickier elevated level of inflation leading the US Fed to adopt a shallower rate cut policy have all led to stronger US dollar. A reduced interest rate gap between the US and emerging markets has led to continued redemptions by FIIs in emerging markets.
- * On the domestic front, stable political system provides a good visibility of policy continuity. Good monsoons last year would help with strong agricultural output. High frequency data has been mixed, the rural economy seems to be on a mend and is expected to improve further in coming months, helped both by better agriculture produce and govt policies. The banking credit growth has slowed down both due to lower deposits and regulator clampdown on unsecured lending which might affect retail demand and corporate demand as a second derivative.
- * FY 2025-26 budget held a lot of promise as it argued for a balancing theme of a consumption boost via. Income tax relief, fiscal restraint and long-term glide path towards fiscal discipline. Alongside capex is expected to revive at with both centre and PSU capex expected to pick-up the missing pieces of FY26. Focus on fiscal consolidation in the budget has also provided headroom to the RBI. The central bank has turned accommodative and has been using all tools at its disposal viz. policy rate cuts and turning banking liquidity into surplus territory.
- * Opportunities lie in selective investments, focusing on better growth visibility and quality companies with sector leadership or faster growth rates. Broad based rally is now moving towards selective bottoms up stock picking.
- * Superior performance reflected the earnings growth differential between different market classifications, reinforce long-held belief that equity markets consistently reward higher earnings growth.

Fund manager commentary (2/2)



- ***** Medium term view continues to be constructive; valuations are punchy.
- Some signs of rural recovery were visible, which were missing in the last 2 years. If rural engines start to fire this can add to the demand.
- > Pick up in discretionary spending as income tax cuts start to flow through.
- > Return of government capex, continuation of real estate cycle.
- > Overall credit growth is moderating on the back of certain regulatory interventions and concerns over unsecured lending.
- > On the external front, situation remains comfortable with RBI continuing to hold high levels of dollar reserves.
- > The corporate sector has coped well with the crisis as balance sheets are far stronger compared to the past.
- ***** Brace for Volatility over medium term.
- Markets expected to be choppy due to higher geopolitical tensions and inflationary concerns
- Do not confuse volatility with risk.
- Higher volatility is a friend of long-term patient investors.
- Spreading out investment over a period looks prudent at this stage.

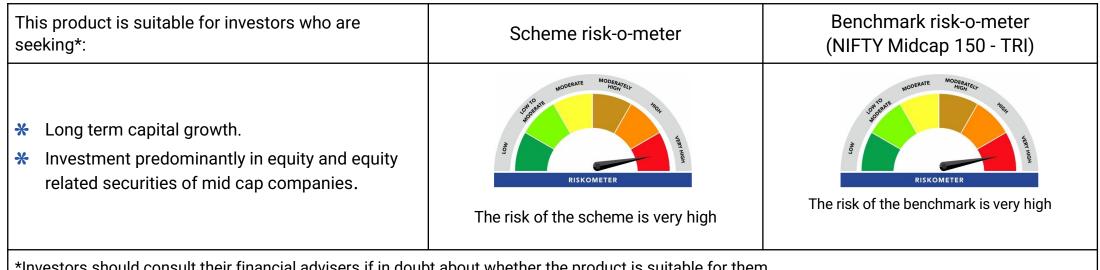
